

S. S. Hermosa, "BP" San Pedro -Avalon run, passenger lst. Ship: vessel, small, no license required (Until 1 Jan., 1913.)

Starting date in February, transferred to S. S. Yale, San Francisco - San Diego, 1 October, 1912 2nd. Ship: to 18 October, 1912. Call "RY". Dan Walters was Chief Operator. To go on Yale I took out COS, Certificate of Skill in Radio Communication, on 22 Sept., 1912. In short time on Yale the Marconi Company took over from United Wireless. I still have one of the old United Wireless Telegraph Company plates from over a door of the "shack". Dan Walters took

3rd. Ship: S. S. Siberia, "WU, later WWU", Pacific Mail combination freight and passenger vessel, Fan Francisco - Honkkong via Honolulu, Japanese ports, Shanghai, and Manila. First trip, Chief Operator J. E. O. Lemieux. Second trip, I chief Operator, and Assistant, Robert B. Black. Was required to be 21 years of age. Had my 20th. birthday in March, 1913 between Honolulu and San Francisco on return . Siberia service, 10/20/12 to 3/18/13. I then left the sea to go to college. On the way in, at Honolulu, took examination and received First Class Radio Telegraph Operator's License, signed by Lieut L. M. Stevens, USN, 24 Dec., 1912.

> Between trips I swapped with Larry Frudhont who had relieved me on the Yale. He wanted to spend New Year's Day in 'Frisco and I wanted to go down and see my girl in Orange. (Yeah ! She is now my XYL, for over 50 years). On return I found that Malarin had had to send Prudhont out on the Rosecrans as an emergency relief operator; bound for Alaska. I had asked for an Alaskan run, so Malarin kidded me. I stayed with the Siberia. A few days later the Rosecrans foundered, with so far as Prudhont's parents or I ever learned up until recently, no survivors. The press so reported, as did the Coast Guard, at the time. Apparently my number was not up vet.

While on the Hermosa I worked the old Yosemite as she sent OQD and was going ashore off Long Beach in a bad storm ... anchor wouldn't hold for long time. It finally cau ht, and saved her. We could not have helped as trying to get close to her we hit bottom and had to get out of there fast.

Have been a radio addict since January, 1908, on the air first in mid-summer of that year, with a l-inch spark coil.

Have had many interesting experiences as ham, commercial and navy radio operator and officer. Made Captain in the USNR in Nov., 1945, just before leaving for home on terminal leave, after 5-1/2 years on active duty. Was Elec.10 (R) USMR in WWI, service ashore and on the Atlantic. Was on Guam when the Japanese party ended.

Learned to operate in the Kana Code (Jap) while on S. S. Siberia

Several others later, including some by FCC, never framed and mislaid. Undoubtedly among poorly filed records. One, in 1933, was for Commercial First Class Radiotelephone Operator as a separate licese from my Commercial Radio Operator First Class also then in effect.

All commercial experience was "SPARK". In WWI had experience with the Puulsen Arc on USS Pennsylvania which was great when all the "alky" needed for its operation had not been diverted, misplaced and guzzled. It usually had been.

My original call as amateur was "QW", later "6QW", "W64%", "then after W I was 6EC", "W6EC", "nu6EC", and back to "M6EC" since. For some years I held "6XE", Experimental.

AND I CAN STILL HEAR IN MY MIND SOME OF THOSE OLD ROTARY SPARK GAPS, old "PH", "NU", et alles. Wish I had had a tape recorder in "them good old days".
