My dear Major Kinsley:

It was with great regret that I approved your memorandum to Colonel Coxe, dated July 2, in which you apply for discharge on or about July 22nd. Due to your industry, loyalty and scientific knowledge, you have built up a most remarkable Radio Intelligence Service which not only did good work during the war and the peace negotiations, but which also provided an immense amount of valuable data from which a similar service could be organized if the United States again becomes involved in war. Due to the very nature of the work which you have been doing, little public recognition of your success can be expected; but I wish to assure you in this personal way of my appreciation of what you have accomplished, as well as my high personal regard for you as an officer and a man.
