- 1. Born St.Louis, Mo., 1889 April 27, son of Fred F. E. and Clara M. Espenscheid (maiden name).
- 2. Educated public schools of St.Louis, and Brooklyn, N.Y. whence he removed 1901 Dec. First electrical inspiration at Boy's High School, Electrical Club (out of hours), and Children's Museum, Brooklyn.
- 3. Started own attic shop and wireless station 1904 at grandfather's home, 1369 Dean St., Brooklyn, N.Y. Continued wireless experimentation and operation until becoming shipboard wireless operator 1917, May.
- 4. Summers 1907 and 1908, Fall 1909, shipboard wireless telegraph operator for United Wireless Teleg. Co. aboard a succession of ships, sailing out of New York City.
- 5. Attended Pratt Institute, Applied Electricity course 1907-1909. Received homorary D.Sc. degree 1957.
- 6. 1909-1910 an assistant engineer with Telefunken Wireless Telegraph Co. of America in New York City. Installed new quenched spark sets for Navy and Army.
- in 1954,
  7. 1910 until retirement/ with Bell System:
  1910-1934 A.T.&T.Co., Engineering Dept., doing research and
  development work, first on loading coils, then on high frequency
  electronic carrier telephony and radio telephony. Many inventions
  including radio altimeter (forerunner of radar); network broadcasting; wide-band coaxial cable (co-imventor with H.A.Affel).
  - 1934 to 1954 (retirement), transferred to Bell Telephone Laboratories, Inc. New York City.
- 8. Participated in a number of international conferences on electric communications. Traveled extensively.

  Did the receiving at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, during the 1915 transoceanic wireless telephone tests, the first such.

  A total of 130 U.S. Patents; some 40 teehnical papers published.

  Exarter Charter member of Wireless Institute and the succeeding I.R.E., becoming Fellow of IRE and of AIEE, now IEEE. Member of several Science societies.

Awards: IRE Medal of Honor 1940;
AIEE "best paper" co-award for Coaxial Bable paper, 1935;
Television Broadcasters Ass'n Medal, 1944;
Radio Pioneers Citation, 1954;
Pioneer Award for Radio Altimeter by IEEE Aerospace and Electronic Systems Group, 1967.

LLOYD **ESPENSCHIED** 

Lloyd Espenschied, one of the Laboratories' most prolific inventors, has pioneered in the development of both wire and radio communications systems during his 44 years with the Bell System. Credited with more than 100 patents, he is usually identified with the development of the coaxial cable system, one of the major methods of transcontinental telephone and television transmission. He and H. A. Affel invented this system in 1929 when he had charge of early work on carrier systems at A. T. & T.

In 1931 Mr. Espenschied invented the first filter circuit using a crystal element instead of the usual coil and condenser resonators. These units are now widely used in coaxial and other broad-band carrier systems.

He is also the inventor of the radio altimeter, whose application to aerial navigation was first demonstrated in 1938, and which foreshadowed the development of radar.

An amateur radio operator in his vouth, he worked summers for the United Wireless Telegraph Company while earning his degree in applied electricity from Pratt Institute. He joined the A. T. & T. in 1910, soon after graduation, and came to West Street in the 1934 consolidation.

The author of numerous technical papers, Mr. Espenschied has also taken part in many national and international conferences on electrical communications. In 1935 he was coreceiver of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers award for the best paper on research and development. In 1940 he won the I.R.E.'s

Medal of Honor, and in 1944 he received the first annual award of the Television Broadcasting Association for technical pioneering in television.

He is a fellow of the A.I.E.E. and of the I.R.E., and a member of the Institute of Aeronautical Science, the Physical Society, and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Mr. Espenschied's principal avocation for many years has been the study of histories-electrical history, the history of immigration from the Old World to the New, and the geneology of his own family. Through his interest in electrical history, he has collected a library of nearly 1000 technical books dating back to the mid-1500 s.

After his retirement, Mr. Espenschied expects to do some consulting work and writing on electrical history.

The Espenschieds are residents Kew Gardens, N. Y. and have married children, Lloyd, Jr., Carol, and four

Dear Frank:

As you see from this messy beginning, I'm too damn old to enter into the activities of any additional society. However, you have so mallified me as to cause me to think perhaps I should join up to pass along my experience. So, consider me "in"; I enclose the \$5.00 dues, if that's the amount. But please do not expect me to participate in any of your events; I definitely am too old for that.

You ask what I did after being with Telefunken 1909-10. The answer is given in a little biographical sketch I've made and enclose. You will find me registered in the IEEE Year Book.

Yes, the old wooden tub SoS. Manhattan on which I started in 1907 was quite a different animal than the ice-breaker that recently conquored the North-Mast Passage. That was quite a feat; nothing like oil to smooth the way! I enclose a sheet from the N.Y. Times of 11 November which hails the arrival in New York of the modern S.S.Manhattan; also the corresponding sheet of 12 Nov. confirming her arrival. Note the tribute to her radio.

Thank you for your last missive, the Rossmoor Leisure World illustrated folder, located also at Walnut Creek, Calif. A very attractive-looking place. So it represents some of the Dollar Line Steamship money! Appropriate enough as a wireless meeting place.

Come to think of it, - I have a photo, which I enclose, of myself as wireless operator on the S.S.Bermudian, 1907, taken alongside the wireless cabin on the upper deck. She was a trim ship. Upon arrival in Bermuda. I found the local newspaper there carried practically no USA news. only a little British news. So, I sat down and copied the 10 PM Press from the Cape Cod station of the Marconi Co. (old "CC"). handed it into to the newspaper office. We sailed and I never knew if they printed it. But next trip, at Hamilton I was met by a Marshall, who took me before some tribunal. I had violated the "law of the land"; the only news allowed was that received via the British cable. I knew not the law, naturally, and was let off; but I did tell them that they were missing something that was in the air overhead, something that American tourists would like. Again we sailed and knew naught thereafter! Wireless was free in those days, but not the international barrieriers.

  - 7. S.S. Adirondack, Peoples Line, (Hudson River Night X D Line, with no questions asked!). N.Y. to Albany. Several trips, then back to Pratt Institute.

8. S.S. Lampasas, Mallory Line. N.Y. around Key West to A R Tampa, Fla., to Mobile, Ala. Two trips, awaiting job.

During that Fall I was offered a job, which took effect beginning 1910, with the Telefunken Wireless Telegraph Co. of America, being an assistant engineer located in the tower of the Trinity Building at 111 Broadway, N.Y. The free-and-easy days, of a wireless operator at sea before there was any license requirement, were over:
